



Colorado=

The Colorado Professional Skateboard Tour had its second competition in Vail most recently, July 9 and 10. The two day event scheduled a Downhill and Freestyle competition on Saturday and a Dual Slalom on Sunday. Professionals from California, New Mexico and Colorado competed for the cash purse which was divided among the above disciplines, the Contest was co-sponsored by the Vail merchants and

Kryptonics Star Trac Wheels Company of Boulder, Colorado.

John Hutson, riding for the Santa Cruz and Road Rider team, earned the largest portion of the purse with first places in both the Downhill and Dual Slalom. Following closely behind Hutson in cash earnings this weekend was Lightening Bolt/HPG Gullwing team member Michael Williams. Williams proved the most consistent competitor by finishing second in all three events to take over as the overall leader in the

Colorado Pro Skating Standings.

Randy Smith of Dillon, Colorado, skated superbly, earning a third in the Downhill Saturday and a third in the Dual Slalom Sunday. Smith, skating on a Heavystick in the Downhill, drew a beautiful line down the 1443 kilometer course to earn third place points, moving him from a tie for 9th place into sole possession of 5th place, just behind Tom Ryan of the Turner Summerski/Kryptonics Wheels Team. Randy Smith also races for the Turner Summerski/Kryptonics Wheels Team.

The Dual Slalom on Sunday proved to be the most exciting event in Another Roadside Attraction's weekend in Vail. Newly built starting ramps, with pro-style, horse race starting doors, added an exciting element to the head to head competition. California pros Tom Ryan, Michael Williams and John Hutson exhibited an aggressive style and certain fitness that made them favorites in the eyes of the thousand-plus spectators that turned out for the Slalom. John Hutson proved to be the most consistent of all racers. Powering his way out of the starting doors, Hutson gained the speed he needed off the top of the course (the decided difference) to cross the finish line first in each of his head to head runs. His hardest fought victory came against California rival Michael Williams. With only a .443 second advantage going into the final round for the Championship, Hutson turned in the fastest time of the day for the win. This competition proved to be very stirring amongst the spectators lucky enough to see these fine pros from the West Coast.

The surprise of the weekend was a young skater from the Pop Tops Team of Albuquerque, New Mexico, Randy Watson. Watson's repertoire of tricks earned him first place honors in the Freestyle Finals, Saturday evening. Then Sunday, through back-to-back, unfortunate mistakes by his opponents, Randy Watson found himself competing in the semifinals against John Hutson. The rest is history, for he raced in the consolation round against Randy Smith, who had to overcome a disqualification penalty after falling just before the finish line in their first race, taking a respectable fourth place.

The next stop on the Pro Tour is July 23rd in Aspen, Colorado. Another Roadside Attraction welcomes all competitors serious enough to race against the best from California, New Mexico and Colorado.



Colorado RACES

Peter Camann, director of "Another Roadside Attraction" has the hottest open elimination circuit this paper has ever heard of. Basically a 7stop circuit operating in Colorado, it has quickly gained the respect and support of the pro skaters from California, the local merchants from each town, the ISA, and generally anyone who has the golden opportunity to see a race in such places as Vail and Aspen.

The circuit was developed into a "professional and amateur tour for the advancement of the sport and the benefit of those who desire to compete." It is truely a race for racers - not TV, not spectators. But what happens when the center of the race focuses on the racers themselves? The turn out is super. Camann got the financial support of about 45 merchants in Vail - most of whom came out to watch the race itself. As in Akron, Ohio, townspeople are amazed and thrilled at the professionalism of the sport and the skaters themselves.

Camann has formulated a ranking point system in order to determine the ranking of pro and amateur skaters competing in the circuit. Thus, as in any sports' circuit, the racer most frequently competing has a better chance of accumulating more points in the system. This offers the most credible system for determining "who's hot." Even visiting pros who go to Colorado for a race and do well still will not have as high a rating as local skaters who are there to compete in all of them.

The point system counts the top ten places for Giant Slalom, Downhill, and Slalom. Dual slalom (head-to-head) awards points through the top 16

racers - those placed on the single elimination ladder. Freestyle awards points for the first eight places.

The first race was held in Boulder, Colorado, and was reported in the June NSR. It featured a Dual Slalom course down the main street of town and open to pros and amateurs. The single lane (not head-to-head) Giant Slalom/Downhill was open to those of high school age and pros. Visiting pros Tom Ryan, Mike Williams, and Bob Piercy were amazed at the level of competition they had to face. Commented Ryan, "I was really impressed with the mental attitude of the Mountain Boys. I found them very hungry racers.

They all returned with reports of how well the race had been directed. With eight weeks until the next race in Vail, the operators of "Another Roadside Attraction," Peter Camann, Dick Reische, and hot racer Randy Smith all returned to California with Tom Ryan to check out La Costa and meet more involved people. Planning on one week in California, they didn't leave for a month - too much to talk about, too many people to

Camann: "I saw how skiing is tied really well with skateboarding and surfing. I enjoy working with the pros because they do it the best! I'm

stoked on the energy and I just want to do it better."

The Vail race drew more Californians: John Hutson of Santa Cruz skateboards, Denis Schufeldt and Steve Schisler of Magnum boards, as well as support people (girlfriends and wives - Vail is hard to pass up). Mike Williams and Tom Ryan returned for this second meeting of Colorado and California racers. An outstanding team from Albuquerque, New Mexico drove up for this event. The Pop Tops' Team, headed by Guy Watson, was a knock out. The final results from Vail tell that story.

The Vail contest held another GS/Downhill race. This is a single lane downhill run that includes 5, or so, cones spaced a long 40' apart that the racer is required to take on the proper side. Not actually a slalom, the cones serve to keep the racer from meandering the full width of the 1/2


The freestyle event was held on the ice skating rink - a perfect spot. The surface of this dry ice rink is excellent for Freestyle. The night lights are an added bonus. Judged by a competition freestyle skier, an experienced skateboarder, and the editor of the "Review", the trials were held in the afternoon following the Downhill. Then a few hours break until the evening Freestyle finals.

Awards were given at the end of each day's event. Pros received a total purse of \$275. for 1st, \$175. for 2nd, and \$100. for 3rd, and \$60 for 4th. Amateurs received prizes donated from Kryptonic Wheels, Heavy Stick, Moore Boards of Vail, All Season Sports (Frisco, Colo.); start gates were by Heavy Metal (Dillon, Colo.). The purse and prizes were solicited from the local merchants by Camann in the week prior to the race.


The dual, elimination Slalom course for Sunday was set up on an entry ramp to a parking building - a strange place for a slalom in a state filled with mountains. The entries all took a run in each lane. The best run was considered as the top 16 were seated in a single elimination "ladder." The race then proceeded through quarter-finals, semi-finals, and finals. One and that racer does not advance to the next heat. It is pretty throat." A racer has to be consistently fast. Results are on page 6.

Stories filtering to prime competitors and California manufacturers all but guarantee an even bigger turn out of visitors for the next race scheduled in Aspen, July 23. "Another Roadside Attraction welcomes all skaters interested in competing. We appreciate good competition and extend an open invitation to all visiting professional and amateur skaters. Best of luck to you this season and we will see you on Race Day!"

TOMMY RYAN gets the quick start.








STEVE SCHISLER, of Magnum Boards, in the Colorado downhill race.






program.

balance . . . To be continued






LA COSTA BOYS GOING TO BOISE
