WEEKLY RACES AT LA COSTA

Skateboarders have been using the outer hills of La Costa frequently since last summer; mostly one wide, long Black Hill. It was only a matter of time before slalom courses were set up and not long after that was there a regular group of skaters every weekend. The two predominant flex boards were the Gordon and Smith Fiberflex and the Turner SummerSki. Racers using both boards were well matched: Henry Hester, Tommy Ryan, Bob Skoldberg, Bob Piercy. It didn't take long for a challenge to go up to see just which is better.

That was five months ago and the casual weekend racing at La Costa has had quite an evolution. In the beginning, the course was set up by whoever was there first, skaters practiced, and when everyone was there and ready the race started. After a few weeks some definite decisions had to be made concerning fees and other issues. It was decided the entry fee would be \$4 to try for the purse, \$2 to race for a time and the experience of racing, .2 seconds would be added to the time for each cone hit, the third cone hit would disqualify (DQ) that time, a missed gate is DQ, no practice runs are allowed after a race has started and there would be four trial runs in the finals. These rules have been accepted and used sinces that time.

In the middle of January construction at the top of Black Hill forced racers to seek out another hill. Several were checked and it seems racing has settled on another undeveloped hill in La Costa called Box Canyon.

The races are basically the same each week: on a Sunday, starting about noon or 1:00, timing is done with a flag start or walkie-talkies, and timed with a stop watch at the finish line. Small changes are made depending on what the racers want to do purse or no purse, head to head, how the course will be set up. The key to the enjoyment of our weekly races is that the racers can make it anyway they want - they just have to speak up.

What's the evolutionary step from here? There is some talk of electrical timing eqipment, some talk of an association of these regular racers who are easily the best in the world, some talk of a racing circuit "beating the pants off everybody in their own home town". Who knows? The strength of whatever happens lies in the fact that it works because the racers themselves want it to.

VENTURA HOLDS ITS SECOND SKATEBOARD CONTEST

The Recreation Department of Ventura, California, with direction from the USSA, held its Second Annual Skateboard Championship Competition on February 14 & 15. There were over 300 entries in the freestyle, slalom and downhill speed run events.

The slalom course was marked by the large traffic cones spanning a distance of about 80 yards. The top section consisted of four cones spaced so far apart it was a slow start. The "no-pumping-after-the-line" rule made for a frustrating opening for those racers used to a fast course - such as the one used by racers regularly at La Costa. Speed picked up as the course turned down around a corner. This portion seemed more like the familiar Giant Slalom: needing wide, calculated, pumping turns. As usual, the last, tight secstion took the most concentration; the cones were spaced 10-12 paces apart, enabling skaters to draw a tight line through the cones. "It could have been faster at the top and tighter cones at the bottom," commented Joe Roper, racer.

Racers had adequate time to practice during the day. The race was set as follows: two trial runs, two final runs, no pumping past the line at the top, if racers fell off their board they were permitted to get on again and, without pumping, finish their race for a recorded time, cones could be hit, riders were disqualified only for missing a gate.

The timing of the race was not ideal. The starter called, "mark, set" a gun was fired for "go". As he heard the gun, a flag man lowered his flag to signal another flag man. His lowered flag signalled three people with watches at the finish line. The average time of the three watches was then recorded. Apparently, walkie-talkies could not be used due to active CB radios in the area, and USSA declined to use timing equipment.

Henry Hester won first place on the Men's Slalom. He said he enjoyed the race and the workout involved in winning. "THE MAN OF THE DAY" was definitely Bob Skoldberg. claimed race officials at the awards ceremony. Skoldberg placed second in both the Men's Slalom and the Downhill Speed Run.

Comments on the contest were as varied as people themselves: "It turned out better than I thought it would" - Steve Cathay, racer; "Contests like this will keep skateboarding in the same class as the Duncan Yo-Yo Contest" - John O'Malley, racer; "It was a very skill demanding race" - Chris Yandall, racer. It would be impossible to guess how the majority of the racers and spectators felt about Ventura's 1976 Contest. It would be my guess their Third Contest (1977) will draw as good a response as this one. It made for a fun and challenging weekend.

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Carlsbad SkatePark Opens

Carlsbad SkatePark has finished its Beginners Bowl and is open to the public. They now look forward to the completion of their Canyon and FREEWAY Slalom runs. It will incorporate standard competition facilities and promote local contests.

SkatePark constructors Jack Graham and John O'Malley have planned the Park to accomodate competitive freestyle and slalom events. Spotlighted in the facilities will be standardized freestyle areas as well as two fifty-meter slaloms, a banked slalom of optional lengths up to 700 feet and a Mogul slalom. As a professional facility there's high hopes for large scale contests with national coverage.

"Weve tried to allow for as much diversity as we can possibly get out of 80,000 square feet of surfacing and satisfy both beginners and pros at once," says O'Malley, "and we've merged our day-to-day activity design with sound racing conditions. A rider can opt for a slow cruising speed or go for a 30+ m.p.h. run through a series of interwoven bowls and banks ranging from three feet to thirteen feet and exert up to two "g's" on himself in the process."

"Safety," Mr. O'Malley later went on to explain, "is a key point to be stressed at Carlsbad SkatePark. Protective gear will be worn by anyone skating there, to include helmet, gloves, knee and elbow pads and shoes."

Other services to be contained within the Park's facility will be skateboard school, pro shop, and a center complete with a canteen and game room. "The haul-up will be favorite attraction of all the skaters", O'Malley continued, "It'll enable riders to do some serious skating and direct their energy towards trying to tackle the Carlsbad Challenge fully." WHAT'S THAT? "Well, said John, with a smile, "I guess you could call it our unofficial slogan: If you've got the balls we've got the walls.
